They say that Shettler Elementary School was built in 1961. But there were new additions to Shettler in 1968 and 1998 as well as renovations in 1998 and

They keep saying that Fruitport high school was built in the 1950s. But new additions were built in 1963, 1968, 1998, 1999, and 2005, as well as upgrades in 2003 and 2004.



VOTERS BEWARE!

The Fruitport school administration and their supporters are continuing to try to deceive Fruitport school district voters. They are still telling voters that Fruitport High School was built in the 1950s, when just about everyone knows that this is not the truth. One small section of Fruitport High School was built in the 1950s, but a majority of Fruitport High School was built in the decades following the 1950s, with large portions being built as recently as the late 1990s and 2005, and renovations as recently as 2010 [information from Fruitport school superintendent Grand Haven Tribune - October 27, 2015]. Why are they continually misleading the voters? In a recent mailing to voters, they claim that Fruitport high school " is the third oldest high school in West Michigan". This is totally false. Fruitport High School is not even the third oldest high school in Muskegon County, let alone all of West Michigan. Muskegon High School [1926], North Muskegon High School [late 1930s-early 1940s], Muskegon Catholic Central High School [1953], are all older than Fruitport High School [see images below].



All of the above high schools have had renovations since they were originally built, just as Fruitport High School has. This is just one more misleading statement from the school administration and their supporters.


school with new science rooms and labs; robotics, STEM and wood shop area; art room, bathrooms and corridors; media center, kitchen and cafeteria; classrooms, athletic locker rooms, auditorium and parking lots and improved traffic

NOTE: Voters should also be aware that if they approve this bond proposal, they are approving only the sale of \$51,000,000 in bonds, **not** the 3.9 debt millage rate. If this bond issue is approved, the school district has the power to tax without limitation as to the rate or amount to insure the repayment of the bonds. In other words, if the tax base of the Fruitport School District should decline in the future due to poor economic conditions, the school district could, by law, increase the 3.9 millage rate to a level necessary to repay the bonds without our vote!

Remember, nothing we are being told about **future** growth projection is certain. Anything can happen as it did in 2008 with the economic collapse.

Please remember that new buildings do not translate into better educated students, as can be documented by other school districts in our area. Some schools, such as Muskegon Catholic Central and North Muskegon, have the oldest buildings and have the highest test scores, and some schools have the newest buildings and have some of the lowest test scores. 
